

MISSION MOMENT - CITY OF ANGELS

Recently my daughter invited me to join her for a cruise to Mexico and Honduras. The seven-day adventure offered a host of optional excursions in the three ports of call. One could visit the island of Cozumel situated just off the Yucatan Peninsula. Another explored the replicas of huge Mayan Ruins and listening to the sounds of the rhythmic Mariachis. Yet another offered scuba diving and snorkeling opportunities near the Palancar Reef ...all tourists' delights! One excursion that drew my attention and curiosity was a visit to the 'Cuidad de Angeles' - an orphanage for children.

As I read the brochure's description of the facility, which offers a permanent, total-care home for children in need, I was both curious and intrigued. Its services include physical, intellectual, emotional, and spiritual support for each child. In fact, it 'provides a safe and healthy environment based on Christian principles for orphaned, abandoned, abused, and needy children living in Mexico.' Having visited/served in two Orthodox Christian children's homes (Guatemala and Albania) and teaching young adults in Tanzania, I was eager to make a comparison.



As our group disembarked the ship, we met up with a Guide at an assigned location to board our transport. The Guide's name was Chris - (or Christopher just like my first-born son). We drove through the streets of the town, occasionally stopping to visit outdoor markets filled with produce, fish, and handmade crafts. Eventually we reached the gates of our destination.

The grounds were beautifully maintained ...palm trees, shrubbery, flowers here and there. In the center stood a large church and across the road was a building with clothing/non-perishables made available for those in need. We walked to another building where we met the Headmistress and a nine-year-old boy who had just been welcomed to his 'new home.' Seated next to the child was a man and woman assigned to 'foster' him. The little boy looked rather solemn. The other twenty-plus resident children were at school. Hopefully, the young lad would adjust and fit in...

As we continued to walk the grounds, we came across an outdoor church in a pavilion setting. There were two women carefully decorating the altar area with flowers. (Our own Irene C. and Maria K. came to mind as I watched them tend to their task.) We took some group photos and noticed several tree branches and bushes that were covered with white ribbons. We were told that children write their hopes and prayers on these, tying them to branches, offering them to God. At the base of the trees were several potted plants. The Headmistress told us that regardless of heavy rains or occasional hurricanes, those plants surrounding the base of the trees with ribbons are never damaged or destroyed, unlike others nearby! Fortunately, this day of our visit was lovely, sunny, calm, and beautiful!

We proceeded to enter a large indoor church which still displayed a life-size Nativity Scene just beyond the sanctuary, next to a grated window. Shortly after our Guide spoke about the significance of the faith of children, a gust of wind came through the window blowing down a number of the life-size figures! It was a bit startling to say the least.

Whether it is here in Mexico, or in Guatemala, Albania, or Tanzania, there are folks who truly want to help the innocent and 'the least of these' - young children. While laws vary from country to country, in Albania the government requires children be 'let go' at age 15 from such facilities. In this orphanage, facilitators try to function without government assistance, housing children until fully grown/enabled with no restrictions on age. (In fact, one man that was raised on the premises, now offers his services as an adult, working at this home!) In Guatemala, the government has limited or prohibited the adoption of its orphaned children, allowing few exceptions. (That's my understanding, as of several years ago)



"The City of Angels" seeks foster parents who will sponsor a child in order to help feed, clothe, and educate each and every one. In fact, one couple from Texas and another woman from the States within our group, were hoping to visit with the children they support through regular donations. Unfortunately, we were there on a weekday when all the children were in the public school.

There is one more service offered at this particular orphanage. I had taken photos of a glass-enclosed structure that had huge depictions of the Blessed Mother, Jesus Christ, and Pope John Paul II on the interior glass walls, which were built in squares. Initially, I wasn't sure of the building's purpose. Then I noticed the numbers and letters on the fringe of the huge images. After inquiring, I discovered it was a mausoleum that contained the remains of children. Its purpose is to help the most indigent in the surrounding area who could not otherwise afford a traditional funeral/burial for their children. How sad, yet poignant!
