Grief and Loss Workshop Rescheduled



Preparation for Holy Communion

An Orthodox Christian prepares by fasting from food and drink from bedtime until receiving Communion Sunday morning. If medication has been prescribed by a doctor, it is to be taken as directed. If there are other health issues, the



priest will advise you with compassion. Prayer accompanies fasting, and your conscience may call for Confession. The Sacrament of Confession is available before or after most Services or by appointment.

That Our Grandchildren Be Orthodox

Two key words that might best describe an Orthodox family are "love" and "togetherness." From these words one can envision the many steps that a husband and wife will follow through the years they are with each other, beginning with the day they are married and, most significantly, once they've given birth to children.

The love within a family is unlike any other yet greatly resembles that expressed within the Blessed Trinity. It is a love mingled with sacrifice and selflessness, strengthened by discipline and obedience, nurtured by faith, trust and hope. Ideally husband and wife should love and mutually respect one another and their children. Parents shall have authority over their children with the father as "head" and mother as the "heart," so to speak, being supportive of her husband. With this love as ·a foundation and a sense of order established, the togetherness of a family will manifest itself visibly in many ways during the time the children and parents actually live together. Hopefully these bonds of respect and love will perpetuate even when the children are grown and completely on their own. This "togetherness" should be a daily condition of family life, be it at mealtimes, during prayer, through sickness, times of total joy and celebration, as well as times of distress, disappointment and mourning. Whether family members are physically present with each other is inconsequential at times, for with the special love parents and children have they are always "together" in a sense, even when apart.

It is most important that Christian parents and children worship God together, both in the Church in the sacramental life and in the home. His reality, the acknowledgment of His works and gifts, and the joy and goodness of His creation must not be something that is simply heard from the Scriptures in the church in a ten minute reading. It must be that which is believed by mothers and fathers, lived in their daily lives, conveyed to and shared by their children in a realistic sincere, non-superficial, and non-pretentious manner.

Certainly in our society today the conditions and secular aspect of our environment can greatly influence, even jeopardize, the ideal family situation as described herein. Problems abound in all segments of our lives, from marital separation and divorce becoming almost commonplace, to the bombardment of what we supposedly "need" in the way of finance: credit ratings, materialistic "things", prestige, status, total freedom and "rights", suppression of public worship and superior sex life. Our American culture has always promoted the ideas of competitiveness, getting ahead, being a success, every man for himself, in a sense. This has often resulted in a greedy, wanting, gluttonous, lust-filled, all-consuming consumer type of person who can only find happiness in "deodorant spray can." It is this type of surrounding and influence that actually works against the Christian family an makes the job of parenting even more difficult. Children often want to imitate and be like others who are allowed to do this or that, have everything, or whose parents simply "don't care" what they do, as I have heard on more than one occasion from other boys and girls. Good Christian parents must care.

So then, what are the solutions for raising an Orthodox family today? One can only make suggestions and provide guidelines patterned on those writings given in Scriptures: "Husbands love your wives." "Be subject to one another." "Children obey your parents in the Lord." "Do not provoke your children to anger, but bring them up in the discipline and instruction of the Lord" (Ephesians). Prayer and participation in the sacraments and liturgical life must be practiced by the whole family. Forgiving one another and trying to help each other's weaknesses rather than condemning them, to support to each member.

Teach children to search out the good in all people and in life itself. Surely hardships, frustrations and anxieties will be thrust at children all their lives and difficult choices will have to be made. Showing them to trust in God, to be moral, truthful and upright in all things and above all acquiring a healthy respect for all of creation will give them strength to face all situations. They must know that all is God's and whatever gifts He has given them must be cared for and nurtured so that they in return may share them with others. On this particular subject I make reference to a newsletter which we recently received from a major New York bank. It read, "According to the latest study by the United States Dept. of Commerce, a man or woman with a bachelor's degree today can expect to earn approximately \$300,000 more during the course of a lifetime than a non-college graduate." Rather than encouraging education so that people might be better equipped to help their fellow man, to be more knowledgeable in their chosen fields, to make a useful and productive contribution to society at large, the priority in reference is given to "potential lifetime earnings." It is this attitude and sort of reasoning that poses a great challenge to Christian parents. Do we have the proper vision, fortitude and lifestyle with which to provide our children so that their children will continue to be a part of an Orthodox family and tradition? It is with a sense of honor that many of us can say that our parents were Orthodox. How much greater it would be to be able to say, "our grandchildren are Orthodox!"

Why we bless our homes

As Christians, we are engaged in a struggle to reclaim fallen nature for the Kingdom of God. We often talk about this in terms of our own salvation, but the Church, addressing all of creation in a holistic manner, also reaches out and reclaims a bit here and a bit there of creation in general. We do this in order that we might restore the usefulness of creation for working out our own salvation. Hence we bless anything that might help us in our salvation - and by blessing it we reclaim it consciously for the Kingdom of God, which means we live according to scriptural teaching.

There are few things more vital to our lives than our homes. In our homes we pray, we work, we talk to others, we order our lives, we work out our marriages, etc. What more important place to reclaim for the Kingdom of God. We do not wish to live in a place which is occupied by the enemy. For the most effective working out of our salvation, we must drive the enemy out of our homes, and keep him at bay by our prayers, our righteous life, and the annual sprinkling of Holy Water at Theophany.

The Service

When the priest arrives, he is to be greeted by all of the family members, each asking his blessing and reverencing his right hand or hand cross he is holding. All members of the household should be present for the House Blessing. If you live alone, please arrange for a friend or neighbor to join you for the prayers, for propriety's sake.

All who are present in the house should gather around the icon with the candle. They should, if they are able, join in saying the Trisagion Prayers and sing the Troparion of the Feast of Theophany. During the service everyone in the house prays together for the living and the dead, and all who live and have lived in the house. Then a family member leads the priest through the house with the candle. As he goes, he sprinkles holy water, and prays for a blessing upon each room and the activity that goes on there. When they have gone through the entire house, the family gathers again around the table and the priest blesses each person present.

Preparation

Traditions of the ceremony differ according to local custom, but these general guidelines should be observed:

- 1. A candle with an icon and a small bowl of Holy Water will be placed in a suitable place, such as kitchen or dining room table, or a home altar. This is where the service will begin. (Father will bring these items, or you may provide your own.)
- 2. Also, a clearly written list of the names of loved ones for whom prayers are to be offered, including members of the family and all those living in the house. Also, another list of the names of departed loved ones should be prepared. These two lists should be clearly marked as "Living" and "Departed."
- 3. The home atmosphere should be calm and peaceful. All televisions, radios, stereos, electronic devices, etc., in the home should be turned off.

Some concluding thoughts

If you'd like to invite the priest for refreshments or a meal, please pre-arrange it. Please remember that all refreshments should observe the fasting rules appropriate to that day.

Please confirm your appointment with the priest via email or phone.
