A Message from Fr. Herman

Greetings Brothers and Sisters,

Lent is at our doorstep. We are about ready to embark on our Lenten journey. Last year, our Lenten journey was inconvenienced by COVID-19. This concern is still with us during this Lent. The difference this year is that we have more knowledge and have in place reasonable safety precautions. We are wearing masks (or two masks!), we are social distancing while in the church, and we are encouraging attendance at our services. We will not be deterred in offering our praise and thanksgiving to God for all he has done for us, whether in our homes or in the congregation of the church. (We will continue to have signup for each service.)

With this commitment to move forward this Lent, I offer the following thoughts.

Let us avail ourselves of the opportunities offered for growth in the faith and worship of God. Let us spend less of our time watching TV, checking Facebook, etc. and other unnecessary things with which we in this modern world occupy ourselves, and more time doing what is necessary in preparation for greeting Jesus at the Paschal celebration, indeed, at the very end of time.

Consider these ideas as we go through Lent: What we do today and consistently in our lives is what we become. Jesus said you will know people "by their fruits." We are what we do. Of course, we must prioritize, and we always do what we consider most important. Another truth is that what we are becoming today as individuals will determine our future. If we want St. Andrew's to thrive and continue into the future for our children and loved ones, we must commit ourselves in the present as individuals and as a body to do whatever it takes to build ourselves up in our most Holy Faith. If we do not take responsibility to follow our Tradition, who will?

May each of us commit himself and herself to strive for God through participation in our liturgical services, for growth in the knowledge of the One who created us and sent his son to perfect our fallen humanity. We are called as the Church to offer not entertainment or "happiness," but the blessedness which comes from God's Truth as revealed through the Sacred Scriptures and the Divine Services.

With our masks in place, let us enter boldly into St. Andrew's liturgical life, with our brothers and sisters, as often as we can during this Great Lent, with faith and hope in God.

MISSION MOMENT - THE HOME OF HOPE

'Hope' as a verb means to have an expectation, a fulfillment of a desire. When I first heard of The **Children's Home of Hope in Albania**, I was both excited and intrigued. My very first mission team experience in the Summer of 2000 was to the Hogar Rafael in Guatemala. It was an orphanage filled with children—from babes in cribs to pre-teens. There were four monastics that oversaw the facility, a visiting priest, one married couple (caretakers), a small crew of workers, and two guards with guns posted outside the huge doors protecting the seven-foot walled compound. What I remember most from that experience was the LOVE for and from the children!

What would I find in a "Home of Hope?" First, I read a book about Bp. ANASTASIOS in order to understand the history of Albania and his role in the church there. Second, I knew a bit about Anastasia Pamela Barksdale, a long-term, devoted missionary who leads the teams in Albania. And, of course, once again **there are children who need love and attention**—that's all I needed to know! One more thing, I prayed about it for direction – and both God and my husband said, "GO!"

Eight of us, having never met before, formed a team in June 2017—seven Americans and one Canadian – all Orthodox Christians. We were in touch with each other before meeting face to face at OCMC headquarters in St. Augustine, FL. **Our mission—to teach, live, and interact with boys and girls**, ages seven to fourteen for two weeks. (Fifteen is the maximum age allowed by law to remain in a children's home.)

Our days began and ended with morning/evening prayers in the chapel. Liturgy was served in the Church on the hill. Three meals, snacks, and outdoor/indoor play were interspersed with class time—Music, English, and Religious Education (my class). Our theme for the two-week period was titled, "Gifts of the Holy Spirit." And our team was given the name – "Team Duram" or "Team Patience."



Due to the global pandemic, summer teams are prohibited from traveling overseas. Many of the activities the children look forward to are postponed. There is a need for outdoor activity and one such project is to **build a playground for the children.** Donations can fulfill that hope!

- **A transformation** will soon take place in the church's second foyer, at the handicapped entrance, creating a suitable context for our planned **Wall of Eternal Memory**. Soon you'll be receiving information about this project and your opportunity to make a permanent remembrance of your departed loved ones.

Entering the Church (Late)

The time to arrive at church is before the service starts. If you arrive after the Divine Liturgy begins, try to enter the church quietly, and observe what is happening. If the Epistle or Gospel is being read or the Little or Great Entrance is taking place, wait until it is finished to quickly find a seat. If Father is giving the sermon, stay in the back until he has concluded. Try not to interrupt the Liturgy with your entrance; the best way to avoid this problem is to arrive on time.
